SUNDAY 19th February 2023 Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A

Homily by Fr. John Echewodo

This weekend we continue to reflect on Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. It appears that Jesus was guite determined to expand and perfect the Mosaic Law. There is no doubt that He continues to broaden human interpretation and application of that Law. In the gospel this weekend, Jesus said to His first disciples and to us, His new disciples: 'you have heard how it was said 'eye for eye and



tooth for tooth,' but I say this to you: offer the wicked person no resistance....' Again, you have heard how it was said: 'you must love your neighbour and hate your enemy. But I say this to you: love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you...' Jesus began His teaching by citing one of the oldest laws in ancient Israel, the Lex talionis, the law of 'tit for tat.'

In the Old Testament, for example in Exodus 21:23-25, the Lex talionis states that: if a man had a fight with a woman and the woman died, the man should be executed. If the woman survived the fight but suffered an injured eye, the man's eye must be injured too; if her tooth was knocked out, the man's tooth must be knocked out as well. Give life for life, eye for eye, tooth for tooth, hand for hand, foot for foot, burn for burn, wound for wound, stripe for stripe.' This law applied to anyone and everyone and was not limited to disputes between a man and woman. The law of 'tit for tat' can appear savage unless it is viewed from its historical setting. Rather than being savage, it actually prevented people from vindictiveness. In ancient Israel, before the advent of the law of 'tit for tat.' vendetta was characteristic of tribal society. People took laws into their own hands, and inflicted pain and injuries randomly, even on innocent people. But although the law of 'tit for tat' was introduced to limit vengeance, Jesus feels that it is still incongruent with the Christian message of forgiveness and mercy.

The Mosaic Law as understood and interpreted by the Pharisees and the Scribes was narrow and restricted. While the Mosaic Law insisted that the law of mutuality should regulate human love, Jesus opposes anything that limits the human capacity to love. Jesus presents us with new and radical ways of living and looking at reality which lay the foundation for genuine Christian living.

I have always thought that to be Christians in the genuine and true sense of the word, we essentially need to be walking through life with our heads down - as though we continually need to turn the ideals of the world upside down. As Christians, we are in the world but not of the world - we are both light of the world and salt of the earth. If our light is to shine and we are to continue to add beauty and flavour to the lives of those we encounter, we must do as Christ directs. "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who treat you poorly, give to all who ask, do to others as you would have them do to you, stop judging or condemning, forgive.' These directions are challenging. It is not easy to show love unconditionally, especially towards people we don't like. Even when we try to love our enemies, our efforts can be overlaid with fear and doubt.

Christ appears to have given us one of His most difficult teachings on the practical ways and means of living out our faith and enriching our humanity. Our world lacks compassion, and nastiness and wickedness abound. We, as Christians, need to be different if we are going to a make a difference. We need to swim against the tide.

Many workplaces and families and even our ecclesial gatherings will cease to be spiteful if we, as Christians, set no boundaries on our love. The grace of baptism instils in us an inherent capacity to be more and do more. We can forgive - if we make honest efforts not to retaliate when we are hurt. We can be agents of mercy – if, in the midst of pain and injury, we choose not to seek revenge. Let us not limit the grace of God in us - for whenever we limit the grace of God, we limit what God can do in us and through us.





It started out as a law *limiting* violence – take *no more than* a tooth for a tooth – because people were ready and willing to kill someone over a broken tooth. Jesus put a stop to that. To return violence for violence only continues its cycle, and it justifies violence instead of nonviolence when settling conflicts.

• If someone is angry and wishes to do physical harm to you, what are your nonviolent options?
