SUNDAY 19 March 2023 Fourth Sunday in Lent Year A

Dear Parishioners, Friends and Visitors,

The 4th Sunday of Lent is traditionally called "Laetare Sunday" which comes from the Latin word 'Laetare' which means 'rejoice'. Like the 3rd Sunday of Advent (which is traditionally called 'Gaudete Sunday'), Laetare Sunday takes its name from the opening words of the Introit (Entrance Antiphon) in the Mass of the 4th Sunday of Lent, 'Laetare (Rejoice), Jerusalem'. Laetare Sunday is unique in that rose-coloured vestments can be worn and the altar can be adorned with beautiful



flowers. Although we are still on our Lenten journey, we can look forward and rejoice in joyful anticipation of the Easter mystery.

In the gospel of this weekend, we read and reflect on the story of the blind man, one of the dramatic passages from the Gospel of John. Despite its drama, this gospel pericope brings out the mercy and kindness of Jesus Christ, the Light of the world, who restored not only physical sight to the blind beggar - but also the light of faith.

In healing the blind beggar, Jesus did something which the Pharisees believed only God could do. In the Old Testament (Ex 4:11; Ps 146:8), restoring sight to a blind person is exclusively the work of God. However, writing within the context of the 'Feast of Tabernacles,' which is the Jewish Feast of Light, the Evangelist John presents Jesus as the Light of the World, whose light enlightens all people, and illumines the darkness of human life (John 8:32).

Jesus was making His way to Jerusalem, when He saw a man who had never experienced light before. As this man was born blind, there were things he may have heard but never seen - he may have heard words spoken in anger, and felt the pain of words spoken in revenge and bitterness, but he had never seen the curl of the lips, and the glint in the eyes, or the derangement of the person consumed by anger and hatred. As someone who was blind from birth, this guy had never had an opportunity to distinguish between colours.

Typical of the Jewish belief, the disciples of Christ, like many Christians today, unhesitatingly connected his blindness to his sin (or the sin of his parents). "This man," they asked Jesus: "whose sin caused him to be blind, his parents or his personal sin?" In His response, Jesus reminded them of the fundamental truth of what God is doing in the here-and-now of human life. God, in Jesus Christ, is making all things new.

In the synoptic gospels - Matthew, Mark and Luke, the miracles performed by Christ were often regarded as demonstrations of the compassion of Christ. For instance, when Jesus fed the multitude, Mark wrote that Jesus had compassion on them because they were 'like sheep without a shepherd' (Mark 5: 34). When a leper approached Jesus with a desperate request for healing, Jesus was moved with compassion (Mark 1: 41). However, in the healing of the blind man, compassion was not what prompted or underpinned the action of Jesus. Jesus healed the man to manifest the power and glory of God. "This man was born blind so that the works of God might be displayed in him", Jesus told His disciples.

It is important to note that, ironically, the healing of the blind beggar, led to blindness in those who had physical sight. The great misfortune of the people around Jesus was that they did not see that the glory and power of God could be manifested in the life of a blind man. What about us today? Don't we as Christians, sometimes struggle to discern how the glory of God could be manifested in our affliction, grief, pain and sorrow - or even in our failure. One of the ironies of our age is that, while we have invented microscopes to see things that are small in nature and telescopes to see distant objects, we often don't see that our faith in God can be a living reality in our afflictions and pains. The blind man is the "sent One." He has been sent to remind us of the efficacy of the sacraments we celebrate and receive. Just as the Holy Spirit came

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

May Christ continue to heal and open our interior vision, so that our faith will grow stronger to become not only what we profess on Sunday when we are within the walls of a church building, but also the life we live through all the days of the week.

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
